President's Report Di Lucas

A year on from the very successful Ecopolis conference and the Landscape Awards function in Christchurch, it has been a very full and productive year, and thankfully not as alarming as I feared it might be. We bade farewell to our inaugural Executive Officer, Anita Fulton, after a decade of phenomenal work. We also farewelled editor Barbara Glennie, and Landscape New Zealand as we had known it for 52 issues. I was then nervous of what lay in store....

We most gratefully welcomed Melanie Whittaker who agreed to expand her involvement with NZILA from webmaster to include Executive Officer. Melanie is quickly demonstrating her immense skills and is coming to grips with our myriad tasks and procedures. She is now very much part of the NZILA team. With the enlarging membership, this role requires ever-increasing commitment and it is important we allow a realistic budget. Melanie's skill in the upgrading of our systems for greater efficiency is much appreciated.

I would like to very sincerely thank Anita and Melanie for their marvellous work, their co-operation and the ease with which the transition occurred for the institute and its members. We welcome Melanie to your first NZILA AGM, and I trust it is the first of many.

COMMUNICATIONS

New editor Barb Rogers and agm publishers have over the past year developed two new magazines. A revamped Landscape NZ became a quarterly, larger format LNZ which continues the former magazine's distribution. This is accompanied by the more substantial and popular-style urbis LANDscape, which is also widely available on news-stands.

The NZILA thanks Barb for the freshness and quality of the new magazines, and we welcome you here today to outline your vision for these major communication vehicles. A Memorandum of Understanding has been drafted to define the agreement between the NZILA and agm Publishers. I am grateful to Renee Lambert and our Editorial Advisory Panel members (Sarah Collins, Jan Woodhouse and Melean Absolum) for their assistance with the magazine development and ongoing policy.

One of my failures has been in not producing a regular newsletter. Very few issues of In-Site have emerged this last year. My intent was to convert it to a regular and brief electronic newsheet, perhaps fortnightly. However this would miss the handful of members who are not emailable – now only around 20 out of around 480 members. I leave it to the new Executive committee to decide on and address this task. I suggest an In-Site portfolio holder is needed. The newsheet could give a very brief summary or introduction to a topic, with a hotlink to greater detail on our website and hopefully to magazine highlights.

www.NZILA.co.nz is now our main communication tool within the Institute and beyond. I am thrilled the recent upgrade enables a quick search capacity for colleagues around the country – and members offshore. Please test both the public and 'members only' web directories, as different details are displayed, so make sure yours are correct – and perhaps win an overseas magazine for your effort! With it's recent upgrade our website is a great tool, so please maximise it's use – individually, as a branch, a working group, or as an office. Remember too that offices with Registered members can have their own WebPage within the NZILA site. We are grateful to webmaster Melanie for her efficient and creative management of the site.

The Institute received considerable media profile and recognition this year, making several releases which were picked up by Television News as well as in print. We also ran a series of articles such as in the regional Business Today publications. With palates whetted more were requested, but our resources were stretched. I thank the practices that supported media releases through funding, in particular D.J.Scott Associates.

The NZILA was a partner with EDS (Environmental Defence Society) for the

'The New Zealand Coastal Conference' which allowed for coastal and lakeshore management issues and potential solutions to be presented and debated with a range of professionals and stakeholders.

Unfortunately little progress has been made this year on formal documentation for members use.

EDUCATION FOUNDATION

We are very grateful to the NZILA Education Foundation for bringing their Foundation Scholar Professor Rob Thayer for a speaking tour of New Zealand. The profile and talks were widely appreciated and important for landscape and landscape architecture.

Thank you to Trustees Frank Boffa, Jan Woodhouse and Di Menzies for their efforts in making this tour so successful and for the Branch folk and families that assisted. The value of the Foundation has been very clearly demonstrated.

URBAN DESIGN PROTOCOLS

The Minister of the Environment and HRH Prince Charles recently launched the Urban Design Protocols to which NZILA is a signatory. I was pleased to attend the launch event and the NZILA is now required to develop, monitor and report on a set of actions undertaken to implement the protocol.

2005 YEAR OF THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

NZILA is formally involved in this initiative and we need members' contributions to ensure that landscape architecture is recognised as a serious contributor to the built environment. Thank you to Tim Heath, and to Stuart Houghton and John Hudson for their roles in representing NZILA.

NZ LANDSCAPE STRATEGY & NZILA LANDSCAPE CHARTER

The Executive proposes we develop an NZILA Landscape Charter, this would in turn assist in development of a government-led Landscape Strategy. Simon Smale will explain this further – and welcome offers of assistance.

EDUCATION

We now have three accredited landscape architecture courses in New Zealand. The Education Policy ratified at the last AGM is now being implemented.

The NZILA is pleased to congratulate Victoria University on their accreditation - Roy Fleetwood, Robin Simpson, their university team and first graduates. We thank our Accreditation Panel, chaired by Frank Boffa, with Di Menzies and Glenn Thomas (Queensland).

The Panel, assisted by the Singapore Institute's President, will shortly undertake evaluation of the Lincoln University course in Singapore. Accreditation provides for recognition of graduates in New Zealand as well as overseas through our membership of IFLA.

MEMBERSHIP

I am very encouraged that our membership has grown to 477. When Registration began just 5 years ago we had only 280 members. This year we welcomed the return of a number of members. However I remain alarmed that we have over a hundred members who have been graduated for more than 4 years but are not yet professionally qualified.

HONOURS

This evening we will be pleased to award 8 Fellow Memberships - to the formidable, diverse and well-deserved - Clive Anstey, Garth Falconer, David Irwin, Michael Jones, Gavin Lister, Simon Smale, Robert Watson and Claire Findlay.

We thank the Fellow Assessment Panel, convenor Ross Jackson, Neil Aitken and Jan Woodhouse for their work. We would also thank Neil for preparation of the citation for the NZILA nomination for the inaugural IFLA Sir Geoffrey Jellicoe Gold Medal.

This evening we will present the well-deserved Life Membership to Di Menzies, the first woman Life Member in our 32 years.

Next month, the NZILA will be pleased to present George Macmillan with Honorary Fellow membership.

The names and citations for all the honours will be posted on the web's Awards page.

ASSOCIATE & REGISTERED MEMBERS

We welcome 10 new Associate members today, four of whom have already become Registered. Successful new associates are: Nancy Vance, Bridget Gilbert, Helen Mellsop, Kris MacPherson, Peter Whiting, Debbie Upton, John Potter, Nik Kneale, Bronwyn Bennetts and Sean Burke. We congratulate them later.

The Associate examination is currently the key test for achieving professional status in New Zealand, enabling people to then become Registered annually. Our thanks to the Associate Panel Convenor Nicola Henderson for her great work, and that of her team, Ralf Kruger, Jenny Moore, Clive Anstey and John Brenkley.

We encourage Branches to host and Graduate members to attend the Associate Workshops. And we encourage Graduate members to find mentors and liaise with associate members for guidance to applying for membership.

We expanded the associateship portfolio criteria two years ago. Today, thanks to Melean Absolum, we have a revised Associate Pack to provide greater clarity on the requirements and assist all those Graduates gearing up to apply. Please Grad 3, 4 and 5s, I plead with you to get your portfolios together over winter and swamp the system this year!

<u>Reminder.</u> Members need to note correct references to their membership status. I have seen a number of recent misuses of the NZILA letters by members. "Member NZILA" is <u>not</u> a valid status. Please refer to the Constitution Clause 2.1. FNZILA, ANZILA, Registered NZILA Landscape Architect, and GradNZILA are the only uses now allowed. Some people may have outdated stationery due for renewal. Take care to use the correct terminology.

REGISTRATION

The Executive has focussed attention on Registered membership as full professional status. This year half of our Associate members are Registered – 67 so far – which is double what it was at the beginning of our term. Associates can apply for registration at any time of the year. Our thanks to our Registrar, Rachel de Lambert, who along with Melanie processes the registration applications. Now with 5 years of operating, we welcome Rachel's advice on a review of the programme.

Registered members pay an annual levy, which is for advocacy/promotion. As you will have observed, the Executive committee is giving emphasis to Registered status in all communications.

There is concern at the lack of Registered membership in public sector offices, particularly in local government. In government positions, I suggest a problem may be perceived when people not professionally qualified are assessing the work of those who are. Some local council managers have assured me they are pursuing this through HR means. We are encouraged to see academics becoming Registered as it is very important they too show they are up to date. We hope to increasingly see applications from members within the local government sector.

With government initiatives and requirements for consumer assurance, the outgoing Executive is interested in considering aspects of compulsory registration, and allowing for a review of the necessity to have both Associate and Registered status.

LANDSCAPE LEGISLATION

To proactively address our own, the public and government expectations of professionalism, the confusion with non-qualified people in industry, and, to provide the consumer assurance now expected of professionals, we seek legislation to protect the terms "landscape architect", "landscape architecture" and "landscape architectural".

Following positive discussions with a parliamentary representative, the proposal is to secure these terms through a Landscape Architects Act. The professional recognition provided by NZILA, currently through the Associate and Registered status, is proposed be addressed through this legislation. From the working group convened by Robert Watson, Claire Findlay will lead discussion today to ascertain membership guidance on this task.

BRANCHES

The Auckland Branch hosted a farewell for Barbara Glennie and also a function in November when the Executive Committee met in that city. We welcomed receiving a list of questions from that branch. I would like to congratulate the Auckland Branch on their Spring Lecture series and have been pleased to contribute over the last two years. I suggest this lecture series project is perhaps a model for other Branches – to get discussion and raise the profile of the profession with other disciplines.

The Executive committee was warmly hosted by the Wellington Branch in February. We addressed a list of questions with them, and found this a worthwhile forum. It is unfortunate that, once again, we will have no Wellington members on our Executive Committee. Ensuring we have members with a government liaison role is however important. We thank Clive Anstey for his role with MFE. With all our initiatives I've just described, further liaison folk may be required.

Thank you to the coastal sector of the Southern Branch for hosting what promises to be a fantastic conference, Looking Forward to Heritage Landscapes amidst the marvellous heritage of my Alma Mater, the University of Otago.

WORKING GROUPS

Several working groups have been formed and their level of activity varies. We now have a WebPage for working groups in the "members only" area of our site. We hope this will become widely used, and somewhat interactive. In particular, Anne Steven is to be thanked for her work for the High Country Landscape Group.

RESEARCH NEEDED

I have suggested the NZILA might identify areas where research would be of assistance and make suggestions available to the landscape architecture schools and other research establishments. An assessment of the viability of the wholesale plant industry supplying landscape architecture projects would be a useful MBA study. Analysis and guidance of landscape architecture practice structures and systems would also be useful, particularly for those setting up office. Comparative studies between landscape architectural proposals and the reality achieved would be another.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

I and the Institute generally have been most fortunate to have a great team in the outgoing Executive committee. Melean Absolum has been an outstanding Honorary Secretary, along with her Associate and Education Portfolios in which she has put through major policy and documentation in the two years. She has had formal and very demanding tasks, for which we thank her and we are sad she is standing down.

It has been great to have the presence, skills and experience of Simon Smale as Vice-President and holding the Environment and Legislation Portfolios for which he has provided substantial leadership and contribution. Simon will be missed, and we trust that work to advance our NZILA bicultural strategy will be continued.

Louise Bailey has contributed so much to the NZILA since graduation, both at Branch and Executive level and she is an amazing model for quietly helping to make the Institute work. Thank you Louise, your roles with branches, graduates and students have been much appreciated.

I am pleased that continuity will be provided with Mike Barthelmeh, Grant Edge and Tim Heath continuing on the Executive Committee. Mike's work with Melanie on the website has been valuable. Grant puts in a huge effort for the NZILA as Treasurer and this is very much appreciated. Tim is persistently wrestling with the challenges of the professional bodies liaison, Construction Industry Council and Urban Design, areas where more support from members around the country is needed. Thank you for your commitment.

Incoming President Renee Lambert has been a very valuable Executive member with her work as Awards Convenor, Editorial panel convenor, for the Marketing and Graduate Affairs portfolios. We wish her well for the coming term and look forward to an increasingly relevant and irresistible Institute.

We welcome the new Executive members Brad Coombs, Sue Dick, Mike Farrow and William Thresher. You bring considerable and diverse experience, and look forward to you having an enjoyable and productive term in contributing to leadership of our vibrant profession.

IFLA

I was pleased and fascinated to attend the 2004 IFLA World Council in Taiwan as the NZILA delegate. It was most exciting that NZILA members received 1st, 3rd and 4th in the inaugural IFLA Eastern Region Awards of Excellence. Entries have been submitted for this second year's awards.

IFLA is an amazing world body. The potential for learning and co-operation internationally is endless. Over the last year new member countries have included India and China. To sit around the table with an alphabetical list of nationalities is an experience members should try to experience some time.

An issue raised by delegates from many countries was of landscape architects working offshore without adequate understanding of the local landscape. Members are reminded of the IFLA protocol for any off-shore work e.g. for those working in China, Malaysia, India and elsewhere. These countries are members of IFLA.

2.2 To ensure local culture, place and regulation are recognized by working in conjunction with a local colleague when undertaking work in a foreign country IFLA Code of Ethics (http://www.nzila.co.nz/IFLA Code of Ethics.htm)

Thus as an NZILA member and thus a member of IFLA, if you undertake a project in any country that has IFLA membership, you are required to collaborate with local landscape architects.

Di Menzies deserves enormous thanks for her work as Secretary General of IFLA, and for her years as NZILA delegate. The workload is phenomenal, and I would like NZILA to seek that those international positions receive an Honorarium.

Remember your duties to the landscape.

I have enjoyed and been challenged by my term as President, and thank you for the opportunity.

5.1.8 STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS - DRAFT for discussion

INTRODUCTION

At the last AGM, exec introduced a draft framework for NZILA to develop a longer term strategy plan, with some examples of the types of tangible outcome we could consider. This plan would be reviewed on an annual basis, with the range of possible tasks prioritised for each forthcoming year.

That draft has been updated for this AGM, and is shown below, with one key goal identified for each of the four major headings. Those tasks with a tick have either been completed in the last year, or (the majority!) are currently underway, so some progress can be reported. The incoming exec now seeks a broad input from the membership on other significant tasks or outcomes that could be prioritised within this framework; these specific tasks would need to be realistic, measurable, have an agreed timeline, and note the person or group responsible for achieving the task.

STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS FOR THE INSTITUTE:

THE LANDSCAPE:

GOAL 1 - Raise awareness about the values of our important landscapes.

- 1.1 Develop a wider range of policy statements to assist the Institute, and members, to draw attention to potential landuse change.
 - A) work with branches to scope a range of policy statements about our landscapes.
 - B) develop a policy statement about the importance of our high country landscapes. ✓
 - C) build upon the visit of Professor Thayer to focus attention on the issue of bioregionalism, and develop a policy statement.
 - D) develop a policy statement to confirm the value and significance of our urban Landscapes and the built environment.
- 1.2 Develop an NZILA Landscape Charter.
 - A) form a working group to develop the Charter, modelled upon the ICOMOS charter.
- 1.3 Work with MoE to develop a national landscape strategy.
 - A) form a working group to assist in develop the strategy, modelled upon the 'Biodiversity Strategy' produced by government.
 - B) develop a set of agreed terms for describing landscapes and landscape elements.

Associateship

During 2004 I have undertaken a complete overhaul of the Associateship Application Pack. I am pleased to report that the revised document has been adopted by the Executive Committee and will be available shortly on the website. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who contributed comments on several iterations of the revised documents.

The overhaul has seen no changes to the number of categories from which applicants may choose to demonstrate their competence, nor has there been any change to the work included in each category. Rather, it has been an exercise in making the Pack more user friendly by explaining the process of applying for Associate membership, step by step. The revised document also includes an appeal process for unsuccessful applicants.

Thanks are also due to the five member Associate Membership Panel, ably led by Nicola Henderson, who gave up hours of their time to review all the applicants' portfolios this year and then to interview them all in Wellington. Your dedication to this often difficult task is commendable and I thank you.

In 2004 we had, what I believe to be a record number of applicants for Associate membership and I am pleased to report that we now have 10 new Associate members. Some of these new Associates also took the opportunity to become Registered immediately. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate them all and welcome them as fully fledged members of the Institute.

Education & Accreditation

2004 saw the successful accreditation of the Bachelor of Design - Landscape Architecture course at Victoria University, Wellington. This exciting development brings the number of Education establishments providing courses in landscape architecture to the standards which the NZILA set to three, Lincoln, Unitec and now Victoria as well. Congratulations to the staff at Victoria, who worked extremely hard during the year to ensure that their first Graduates could leave with the knowledge that they had completed an accredited course.

The Accreditation Panel chaired by Frank Boffa and ably assisted by Dr Di Menzies have now turned their attention to the Singapore based Bachelor of Landscape Architecture course run by Lincoln University which will undergo its Accreditation Review in June. The Panel will then move onto Unitec's next scheduled review later this year. The amount of preparation and effort which the Panel put into these reviews is enormous. On behalf of the Institute as a whole, they are ensuring that the various courses provide the right breadth and depth of knowledge to all graduating students. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them both for their continued efforts and also include Glenn Thomas from Australia who has assisted them.

EDS Landscape Planning Guidelines

Following on from the joint EDS/NZILA 'Reclaiming Our Heritage: The New Zealand Landscape Conference' in 2003 and 'The New Zealand Coastal Conference' in 2004 Raewyn Peart, a Senior Policy Analyst with the Environmental Defence Society, has prepared a 'Landscape Planning Guide for Peri-Urban and Rural Areas'. Financial support was provided by Whangarei District Council and Environment Waikato. Along with other professional groups including NZPI, NZILA was invited to comment on the document, and a small group of practitioners contributed useful input. Particular thanks to Clive Anstey and Boffa Miskell for their contributions. The document acknowledges the contributors, while noting that responsibility for the contents rests with the author. It was going to print as this report was being prepared.

Submission on the 'RMA and Electricity Amendment Bill'

Comments from several members on this bill were crafted into a substantive formal written submission to the Local Government and Environment Select Committee. Particular thanks to Peter Kensington of Boffa Miskell and Yvonne Weeber.

Meeting with Minister for the Environment

Minister Marion Hobbs and two of her advisors met for over an hour with the Executive at its 14 February meeting. The Executive had agreed in earlier discussion that lobbying for a National Policy Statement on landscape as a means of raising the profile of landscape nationally was unlikely to be productive, given that the only NPS produced so far is the Coastal Policy that is the only NPS mandatory under the RMA. It agreed instead to suggest development of a 'New Zealand Landscape Strategy' modelled on the existing 'NZ Biodiversity Strategy', including using a similar Ministerial Advisory Committee as was effectively used in development of the Biodiversity Strategy. The Minister is clearly interested in landscape issues, and our proposal for a national strategy was well received by her. We also mentioned to her the Institute's interest in developing its own 'Landscape Charter' modelled on the well-known and much-used ICOMOS charter, and that such a charter if developed would likely be helpful in framing and informing a 'NZ Landscape Strategy'.

MARKETING REPORT Renee Lambert

LNZ (LANDSCAPE NEW ZEALAND) EDITORIAL COMMITTEE

2004 has seen the re-launch of the professional magazine for the Institute. The new look LNZ magazine has now run three issues, August 2004, November 2004 and February 2005. Comments received back from the membership have been favourable.

The Editorial Committee continues to have meetings with AGM to discuss any issues that may have been raised by the membership and to provide input into the theming and storylines.

We continue to work with AGM publishing, LIANZ and the new Editor, Barb Rogers to raise the bar with LNZ and to continue to improve the quality of the magazine.

Major achievements to date include:

- Successful re-launch of the magazine in August
- Significant increase in the buoyancy of advertising for LNZ subsequent to the re-launch (which means a better magazine)
- Forward planning for the NZILA page with topical issues highlighted
- Updating of the Register to make it more readable (due out in May)
- Draft MOU with AGM publishing is nearing completion
- Electronic database link of membership list from NZILA to AGM to improve magazine distribution

Urbis Landscapes

August 2004 also saw the launch of the new landscape based magazine produced by AGM publishing, another component of the highly successful Urbis range of magazines. Urbis Landscapes is designed to appeal to a broader audience and has a wider retail distribution than LNZ.

The three issues of Urbis Landscapes that have come out to date have included a range of topics on landscape issues and feedback from the readers, industry and advertisers has been extremely positive.

AGM want to continue to build and grow the magazine in size and scope and are excited about its potential given the feedback to date.

Any comments or suggestions on both these magazines that you wish considered by the Committee and/or AGM publishing can be forwarded to any of the current NZILA Editorial Committee members; myself, Jan Woodhouse, Sarah Collins, or Peter Kensington.

If anyone is interested in being on the Committee please feel free to contact me. Fresh ideas are always beneficial.

MOU with AGM Publishing

The NZILA is in the process of signing a Memorandum of Understanding with AGM Publishing. The MOU has been developed as a process to manage the interface between the NZILA and AGM Publishing with regard to the delivery of the LNZ magazine and other landscape based published material, such as Urbis Landscapes. The document is intended to clarify the roles and responsibilities of both parties in order to achieve the best possible outcome for both the NZILA and AGM publishing in their respective roles in promoting and understanding of the landscape and its associated issues. It provides the basis of an ongoing working relationship and provides a framework for continued co-operation in achieving shared objectives.

It is anticipated to have a signed copy of the MOU in May 2005.

press releases

Significant investment was made in 2004 to the issuing of press releases by the Institute on a variety of landscape based topics. This was initiated by the successful press release programme that was undertaken for the 2004 awards and the subsequent media interest in landscape issues.

The following press releases were undertaken over the 2004 year:

December 2003 - April 2005

2005 Pride of Place Landscape Awards

Four press releases spaced out over the year in the lead-up to the awards (used to initiate interest), then a frantic week of interviews and further information as a result of the final press release announcing the winners.

January 2004

Kiwi Landscape Designs for London

Press release on NZILA members being short-listed for the Savill Garden project in Great Windsor Park, London and the Hyde Park Corner Garden.

February 2004

Protection for High Country Landscapes More Promising Under Governments Latest Report Press release relating to high country tenure review

27 August 2004

NZ Landscape Architect Honoured

Press release detailing the awarding of life membership to Neil Aitken.

29 July 2004

NZ 1st, 3rd and 4th in International Landscape Architects Awards

Press release detailing the NZ success at the IFLA Eastern Region awards.

This was followed up by a second press release with photos of the awards being given at Taipei on **10 September 2004.**

As a result of the above press releases we have secured a significant amount of media coverage specifically linked to the NZILA. This has ranged from 5 minute spots on primetime news (both channel 3 and 1) to front page newspaper coverage and an assortment of smaller articles. It is estimated that the value of the coverage gained to date is well in excess of \$100,000 which indicates an acceptable cost/benefit for the initial outlay of investment in the press releases (approximately \$500 each).

As a result of the significant increase in publicity, the Executive have started a hard copy file of all the newspaper articles so that we can retain a record of coverage over the years relating to the Institute.

We have budgeted for the 2005 year to undertake a minimum of four press releases throughout the year. It is believed that this is a minimum requirement to ensure that the media stay interested in reporting on landcape issues and to retain an ongoing relationship with and understanding of the la profession. It is intended to spread the releases out through the year and to highlight the profession of landscape architecture in its many forms.

AGM 2005 AWARDS REPORT

IFLA Eastern Region awards of excellence

The NZILA put forward three entries to the inaugural 2004 IFLA Eastern Region Awards of Excellence. All three entries won places, with Isthmus Group gaining a 1st placing for the New Plymouth foreshore project, Boffa Miskell gaining a 3rd placing for Project Manukau and SOUL gaining a 4th placing for the Auckland Regional Botanic Gardens native garden.

Presentations of the awards were held at Taipei at the IFLA Eastern Region Conference. David Irwin attended for Isthmus Group and Di Lucas represented the NZILA.

Entries for the 2005 IFLA awards closed on the 31 March and this year the NZILA put forward two entries. We look forward to the results in due course.

The process for putting forward entries for these awards has been confirmed and involves registrations of interest being sent out to all members and the Executive Committee then choosing three entries from those put forward, that best meet the brief, to represent the NZILA in the awards.

Landscape Awards 2004 Summary

The 2004 awards were very successful and came in under budget. The Executive have confirmed that a separate awards account will be retained so that we can start to incrementally improve the

awards event every year, through the use of any excess funds from the previous awards. The 2004 awards started this process by having an excess of \$1,768.12, which has increased the awards account budget for 2006 to \$4,768.12.

The investment in hiring a professional media company to undertake press releases and coordination of media interviews etc throughout the lead-up to and during the awards proved very successful. We gained more coverage of the 2004 awards than any previous awards and raised the profile of landscape projects within this country significantly.

As the most accessible marketing opportunity that the Institute has it is proposed to continue and expand on this opportunity for all future awards.

As a result of the work undertaken for the 2004 awards, a guideline document has been prepared for the NZILA Awards. This document provides a framework of expectations and requirements for the awards event that can be utilised by successive awards convenors to ensure that consistency and continued improvement is achieved for the awards.

Landscape Awards 2006

Feedback from the membership after the 2004 awards has confirmed that the NZILA believes it has enough members and projects occurring in NZ to sustain an awards event without the need to combine with LIANZ. As such, the 2006 "Pride of Place" awards will be held separately from LIANZ.

Sponsorship of the awards every two years is one of the major risk factors associated with the success of the awards. After the loss of Monier as a major sponsor of the awards, it has required the gathering of not less than ten sponsors for each awards event to ensure the income we need to run the awards. The fact that there are so many sponsors means that the sponsorship package is limited in terms of marketing and promotion of each of the sponsors.

Work has been undertaken to secure one or two major sponsors for the awards that are prepared to commit to sponsoring the awards on an ongoing basis. This will increase the promotional opportunities for the sponsors and alieviate the need to secure sponsors every year.

To date we have had significant success in confirming one major sponsor for the design section of the awards and are in negotiation with a second for the planning section. Once these and the student awards sponsor is confirmed the naming and promotional package for the 2006 awards will be confirmed as the prototype for the awards for the next few years.

Due to the NZILA conference being in Sydney in 2006 (in association with AILA and IFLA), the 2006 awards will be a stand-alone event and not linked to a conference. This presents some challenges, in ensuring that we get the number of people attending the awards to make it the vibrant and celebratory event that it was in 2004 and to ensure our sponsors see the benefits in continuing their relationship with the Institute. We will be looking for the membership to support this event to ensure that we do not loose any of the momentum gained in 2004.

A call for entries for the 2006 Awards will be advertised in June/July of 2005 and further details of the location and timing of the awards will be provided to the membership when the 2006 awards convenor has been confirmed.

Sir Geoffrey Jellicoe Gold Medal Nomination

The International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) has announced an inaugural gold medal award to be presented every four years to a landscape architect whose lifetime achievements have had a lasting impact on the welfare of society and the environment. Calls for nominations from IFLA member Institutes have been asked for.

The Executive Committee feels that it is important to support the award and recognise the role of NZ landscape architects despite our short history, and is pleased to announce that Frank Boffa has been put forward as a nominee for the award by the NZILA.

Proposed new Student Awards

The Executive Committee is considering the establishment of two new NZILA student awards.

One is to recognise the new landscape architecture accredited degree course being provided by Victoria University and to provide an equivalent final year student award as those provided to Unitec and Lincoln University.

The second being investigated is to recognise the increasing number of Masters students work that is being undertaken.

Further details will be available after the Executive Committee meeting in April.

GRADUATE AFFAIRS PORTFOLIO

Draft graduate pack

Comments from the membership have highlighted the need to provide recent graduates with information specifically designed for them on the benefits of joining the Institute and what they can expect from us as a professional organisation.

A draft pack has been prepared which will be supplied to all the Tertiary Institutes (Victoria, United and Lincoln) to send to their Landscape Architecture graduates.

The pack congratulates the students on gaining their professional qualifications and then outlines a range of issues pertinent to them as new graduates and how the Institute can assist in various ways.

This pack will be further developed to provide presentations for students, as outlined in the Student Portfolio report.

STUDENT AFFAIRS Louise Bailey

The relationship between students at the three education providers continues to strengthen. Student membership is presently at 83 compared with 59 2004.

The executive annually supports the final year student exhibition with **sponsorship** and a member from the branch or executive attends the opening. Barb Rogers AGM Publishing is happy to advertise the student end of year exhibitions in Landscape New Zealand. The presence of NZILA at student functions shows support and inclusion for students especially as they venture out of accademia into the professional work place.

The **Graduate Pack** currently in draft form can be adapted for general use in presenting to students of all years providing information about the NZILA. Once completed on CD this can be a useful tool when branch members address the students at the beginning of the tertiary year.

The **student mentor scheme** operates in Canty/West branch with some success. The Auckland mentor scheme is under new leadership and may pick up mommentum particularly with the largest number of student members in New Zealand. Jacqueline Margetts is the contact person at Unitec with Paula Wilkinson as the branch contact. Victoria with substantially fewer student members has

not linked into this scheme. Although the local branch can act as liaison between student and mentor the onus is on the student to actively seek a mentor.

BRANCH LIAISON Louise Bailey

Regular email contact with branch secretaries has helped maintain a good flow of contact with Executive.

A timeline was issued to all branches late 2004 that acts as a reminder of tasks to complete and upcoming events. It can be adapted to branch requirements and updated from information posted on the NZILA web page.

Branches in April/May each year hold associateship workshops with a current or recent Associateship panel member providing up to date information to applicants. A portfolio of a recent successful candidate is also of benefit to show those attending the workshops.

Comment has been noted that branch involvement is erratic and at times it is difficult to encourage members to be involved in both organisation and attendance at CPD events. Executive meetings held in Auckland and Wellington in the past year provided an opportunity to meet the branch members and committees and make personal connections strengthening future contact.

CPD REPORT Louise Bailey

Although the Robert Thayer visit was funded by the Education Foundation, branch committees put considerable effort into organisation of presentations and hosting in their region.

Expert Witness Training workshops run by Di Menzies are being held in many regions as well as at the Heritage Landscapes Conference Dunedin.

Can/West branch have found that holding one major event each year and several smaller ones is manageable. Organisation is usually left to a few members and care needs to be taken not to drain these human resources. With an active NZILA web system, links are now being made to sessions held by other groups and institutes. There are many options for CPD that are not NZILA sourced. The funding provided to branches through membership subscriptions is largely used for CPD events.

CPD events are now posted on the web site and updated regularly. At any time a member can check to see what is on in their region or elsewhere around the country.

WEBSITE Mike Barthelmeh

Our webmastermind Melanie reports an increasing use of the website by members to access information, and a huge jump in the number of job vacancies being advertised. A combination of email alerts and the website itself, have improved the ability of members to be kept up to date, and to communicate more easily with each other.

This year, we have undertaken a major exercise to transfer all of our existing membership information to a database system. This new database will not only enable Melanie to streamline a range of administrative processes that rely on accurate membership information, but also greatly improve the ability to find where our fellow members currently are. Melanie and her team have set up a new search facility on the website for members to find the contact details for a specific person, or for a range of consultants in a particular region for example. It is quick, easy, and accurate, an excellent and useful addition to our website and its functions.

We have previously circulated registered members with an invitation to have their own webpage, hosted in association with the NZILA website. There would be a single charge of around \$250 to prepare the page from images and text provided by members, but no ongoing hosting charges. If you do not have your own website, but would like to have your profile available to prospective clients, here is a great and affordable opportunity for you to consider. 2.2 Explanation

2.2.1 General

The budget is an indicative guide for the Executive as to how it should allocate its money and what is anticipated to be spent on each item.

At each Executive meeting the Executive is given a report from the Cashmanger Programme that gives a Budget/Actual comparison. This allows us to reallocate funds into items where expenditure is low or visa versa. It also assists the Executive to make decisions about spending on unbudgeted items. From time to time opportunities or special issues arise that require us to reallocate expenditure.

At the 2003 AGM, membership gave the Executive the mandate spend up to \$5000 on unbudgeted items.

The main items requiring budget re-allocation or incurring overspend include:

2.2.2 Administration Officer

It was with much regret that our long time administrative assistant Anita Fulton resigned in mid 2004. She was not formerly an employee of the Institute and often did work voluntarily for us. The Executive agreed to employ its very first part-time Administrative Officer. It was acknowledged that the \$15000 budgeted for Secretarial services allocated in the budget may not have been sufficient. In July, Melanie Whitaker was engaged for an average of 20hours per week plus office expenses. We would monitor her work-load and expenditure until the end of the year and then revisit the budget allocation in 2005.

Expenditure over budget (\$8000) has been attributed to several factors:

- Transition costs and over lap/training between Anita and Melanie.
- Increased demand from members to provide information
- Increased demand from the Executive for support services.
- Election year administration
- Office set-up

2005 Budget

We have allowed for further funding of Administrative Services in the Budget

2.2.3 President/IFLA Delegate

The President has undertaken some non budgeted activities (\$5,400) including attendance at the 2004 IFLA Region Conference in Taiwan. Di attended this at the invitation of outgoing IFLA General Secretary Di Menzies. The Executive decided that it was important for the NZILA to have a presence at this meeting especially with respect to our members being awarded two International design awards.

It was agreed that we would pay for Travel (\$2,300) and Registration to the World Congress and the World Council (\$1,400) costs only.

The President's extraordinary expenditure of \$1600 included attendance at a farewell function for the NZ Landscape Editor Barbara Glennie and farewell gifts , meetings with EDS Executives and attendance at their conference as NZILA Partner, attendance at the Auckland Branch Spring Lecture Series. The Expenditure also included books (Raffles) for the Education Foundation Thayer visit.

2005 Budget

We have not provided any funding for the IFLA delegate in this year's budget We have included an item of \$700 to cover extraordinary President's expenditure.

2.2.4 Marketing/Promotion

The Executive decided to reallocate funds (\$500) to assist with promoting the NZILA at as many opportunities as possible. This was in the form of Press releases that cost in the order of \$400 each.

2005 Budget

We have allowed for four (4) press releases in 2005

2.2.5 Landscape NZ

The Landscape NZ Magazine was remodeled during the year and members now have access to two magazines – Landscape NZ and Urbis Landscapes. The \$2500 overspend is due to the revised payment process for AGM and was an advance payment for the first 2005 issue.

2005 Budget

No additional expenditure is envisaged for this year.

2.2.6 Website Development

The Website underwent a significant revamp in late 2004 with a revision to the formatting and improvements to the layout of the site. The additional cost of this was in the order of \$1,000. The Website continues to be a huge success and is now being used regularly by many members.

We have established linkages with other organizations, market conferences, advertise jobs and provide space for Branch newsletters.

2005 Budget

Although the Budget has only allocated \$1000 for further minor refinements, the Executive agreed at its November meeting to allocate a further \$5000 for a significant revamp for Data Integration and the Website Search Engine.

This work has now been competed and was activated on April 19th.

The Executive have allocated Special funds for this to be drawn from the Conference Account.

2.2.7 Associateship

The Associateship team incurred more travel, accommodation and courier costs than expected \$900 over the budget. The large number of applicants required more time and assessment.

2005 Budget

We have allocated \$2500 in this year's budget. The Portfolio report will outline changes to the Associateship Pack and Interview process.

2.2.8 Urban Design Forum

The Executive agreed to support the BRANZ/YBE document in November.

2005 Budget

A sum of \$2500 has been set aside for this in the budget.

2.2.9 Branch Levies

The Executive returns a significant amount of money to the branches each year.

Telecom Yellow Pages

A subsidy of \$60 is paid to Branches for each of the Major telephone Directories in their area. These payments were made in July 2004.

3.1.1 2003 EDS Conference

NZILA partnered this Conference in 2003 with a contribution of \$5000.

The money returned to us was linked to the level of sponsorship that NZILA could generate. We didn't quite meet the target and made a small loss of -\$620 on our investment in mid 2004.

3.1.2 2004 Ecopolis Christchurch

This conference was partnered with LIANZ and made a surplus of \$9481.00 40% (\$3793.00) was returned to LIANZ and the NZILA had a surplus of \$5689.00.

3.1.3 2004 Other Accountant Report \$640.

3.1.4 2005 Heritage Landscape Dunedin

The \$839 pre-payment to the Dunedin Conference has not been included in the 2004 report.

3.1.5 2004 EDS Conference

NZILA partnered this conference with a \$5000 sponsorship. We managed to generate sponsorship in excess of \$10000 thanks to Waitakere City Council and Harrison Grierson. We will be receiving \$5625. This is a small surplus of \$625.

3.2 Current Situation

As at the end of December 2004 we had \$19,954 in the Conference Account.

3.3 Distribution of Conference Funds 2004

As indicated in the Treasurers Report 2003

......Conferences provide the greatest opportunity for the Institute to move forward with strategic issues in the future. The Executive has not yet decided on a capitation level for this account, but I suspect that retaining an operational balance of about \$15000 between conferences would be sufficient for any organizing committee to work with. Income generated in excess of this amount would return to the Ready Access account for the advancement of strategic projects.

The Executive has agreed on a discretionary policy of returning 15% of a conference surplus back to organising branches and determined that 10% of any surplus would also be donated to the NZILA Education Foundation Trust.

3.4 2005 Budget

The outgoing Executive had believed that NZILA needed to expand its sphere of influence and its association with other environmental organizations. The aim was to provide members with a CPD opportunity and market ourselves to a wider more diverse professional community. The association with EDS was a sound one but did involve considerable time and effort from Executive members to effectively generate what amounted to a financially balanced outcome.

The merits/risks of entering future partnering agreements needs to be considered further by the Incoming Executive.

No commitment has been made in this year's budget.

PRESENTATION OF THE OPERATIONAL BUDGET FOR 2005

In setting the budget for 2005 we have assumed an income based on a slight rise over the 2004 figures. This is predicted to come from an increase in membership numbers, more members registering, the CPI increase and sundry income.

Generally, as in previous year's expenditure and income run close together. Executive are continuing to improve communication with membership.

The Operational Budget **excludes** assessment of activities associated with the Conference and Awards Accounts. Income/Expenditure projections for these activities is generally unreliable as they can fluctuate depending on the success of the event.

The Annual Report prepared by the Accountant still has to incorporate these activities to provide our collective end of year position.

The Operational Budget this year **excludes** interest income generated from the Investment and Ready Access Accounts. This income is predictable, however as we intend to continue to roll-over income earned within each account, it is not prudent to place it within the Operational Budget.

The Annual Report prepared by the Accountant still has to incorporate these activities to provide our collective end of year position.

Please find attached the 2005 budget and the financial statements for the 2004 calendar year.

Expenditure Items

The budget is divided into Portfolio activities and administrative expenses in order to track the expenditure and to allow Executive Portfolio holders to manage their own budgets.

The main addition to the list of activities is for the Urban Design Forum. The Executive believe that in the Year of the Built Environment that we must try to improve our public profile with respect to Urban Design issues.

Although activity associated with the Construction Industry Council was not realized fully last year we wish to retain this item on the budget. It is likely that there will be a correlation between this groups activities and the Urban Design Forum. Membership are increasingly demanding more from the institute with respect to advice on Documentation, Building related issues and CPD programmes. Our involvement in the CIC places us in a good position to coordinate information from other professional bodies and government agencies.

As explained previously some decisions were made in the 2004 year that have impacts on the 2005 budget.

SPECIAL PROJECTS - FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Two issues high on the agenda for some action by the Executive are:

1. Documentation Portfolio

The working group has requested that the Executive provide funding for an Associate Landscape Architect to undertake a review of current Documentation provided by organizations such as the Australian Institute of Landscape Architects, the Landscape Institute, the NZIA, IPENZ, NZ Standards and the like. This would involve a web searching, letter writing, emailing and gathering information. The information would be presented to the Working Group to assess its appropriateness and see if our organisation could adapt information currently issued by other or if it is necessary for us to produce our own.

In tandum with this the working group would target specific high priority documents.

2. Graduate/Student Pack

This has been on the agenda for some time and would be aimed at providing such things as a marketing video about the Institute for students and Graduates, a CPD programme specifically to assist Graduates to become Associates.

Costs

The Executive has undertaken preliminary estimates of costs and believe that they would both require funding in the order of \$5000 each.

Review of Subscription Invoicing

The Institute has a very complicated system of invoicing. Subscriptions are based on Membership categories. We have three payment options: Discount, Standard and Late We have overseas rates and hardship rates.

In June we look forward to the NZILA Education Foundation's first scholar, Professor Robert Thayer, visiting for a programme of public addresses throughout New Zealand. Our thanks to the Foundation Trustees (Frank Boffa, Jan Woodhouse and Di Menzies) for organising this.

Exec recently formalised the procedure for future funding by NZILA to the Education Foundation.

Di reported on the establishment of Ruru, an informal group of our Fellow, Life Members and past presidents, to provide a sounding board to better utilise the wisdom, experience and institutional corporate memory.

Appreciation was also extended to Diane Menzies for her stirling work as NZILA's IFLA representative.

6 PRESENTATION OF THE ANNUAL ACCOUNTS

Grant Edge, on behalf of the Executive Committee, presented the Treasurer's Report and Annual Accounts for 2003.

The Institute's finances continue to remain in a healthy position. A number of factors have contributed to this, including:

- a small growth in membership;
- a greater interest by Associates in Registration;
- electronic distribution of information to members using email;
- the distribution of job advertisements through the website and via email.

Position at end December 2003 – surplus of income over expenditure of \$2582 was substantially down on 2002, but this was due to unusually high income received from conferences. The surplus from the Café Ecology conference was received late and included in the 2002 financial accounts.

Investment Account – now has a single fund that meets the Institute's financial goal of having the equivalent of one year's operating income in Reserves.

Conference Account – the set up of this account was enabling better management and recording of conference funds and expenses.

Awards Account – again, the set up of this separate account was enabling better management and recording of awards' funds and expenses. It was suggested that the Institute look at establishing a major sponsor for the next awards programme well in advance to reduce the amount of work required to generate necessary sponsorship.

7 PRESENTATION OF BUDGET FOR 2004

Grant Edge presented, on behalf of the Executive Committee, the proposed budget for 2004.

In setting the budget, it was anticipated that there would be a slight increase in income due mainly to an increase in membership numbers, more members registering, the CPI increase and sundry income.

It was noted that under Sponsorship, \$600 had been budgeted, yet \$5527 has been spent. Grant confirmed that the awards programme had incurred this expenditure. This would now be recorded separate from the main expenditure list.

Diane Menzies confirmed that \$500 for IFLA Travel is not required again this year, as her airfares would be covered by IFLA. Di M. recommended that, as NZILA's President was invited and often expected to attend a number of conferences throughout the year, the IFLA Travel fund be put towards the President's travel to conferences.

Steve Dunn asked if Exec had considered providing funds for Branch CPD events. Di Lucas replied that Exec had considered this but felt it would be more appropriate to fund national CPD events only, rather than locally organised CPD Branch events. Branches receive a levy from the Institute in the form of two payments per year that could assist with Branch events.

Yvonne Weeber asked if funding for Associateship workshops and travel costs for the workshop convenor had been included in the budget. Di Lucas and Grant Edge commented that Branches organised their own workshops and were able to meet the associated costs. Melean Absolum offered to meet with Robert Watson and Nicola Henderson to identify immediate past panel members who could best assist with Associateship workshops throughout the country and thus keep costs to a minimum.

EDS Conference 2004 – Exec had entered into a co-sponsorship role with the Environmental Defense Society (EDS) to help promote their August conference on Coastal Issues. Contractual arrangements were being finalised. It was agreed that a \$5000 float be made available to EDS.

It was MOVED and CARRIED that:

9 CONFERENCE / AGM IN 2005 AND 2006

9.1 2005 Conference

The Executive Committee had received a proposal from the Southern Branch (Dunedin members) to host the 2005 conference in Dunedin, with the suggested theme being Heritage Landscapes, and to be held in late April.

Di Lucas asked members present if they supported the proposal. Members present agreed that the 2005 conference proposal be accepted, with the full support of the Executive Committee.

Diane Menzies reported that there was a proposal to hold an Eastern Region conference (involving NZILA and AILA) at the end of 2005. Di Lucas commented that she saw this as being mutually complementary, and NZILA would still have its AGM and Conference in April 2005. Di asked members to support the concept of having both conferences in the same year. Paul Costigan (AILA) was keen to meet with Executive Committee members in April and the Eastern Region conference was an issue that could be progressed.

9.2 2006 Conference

No proposals had yet been received for hosting the 2006 Conference.

10.3 NZILA-Frank Boffa Award

The recipient of this Award was Penelope Fletcher from UNITEC. Melean will present this Award at the function on 7 April.

10.4 Associateship

Katherine Banks, Thomas Carter, Peter Kensington, Phillip Millar and Jessica Staples were elected to Associateship of NZILA.

11 REMIT

No remits were received.

12 EDUCATION FOUNDATION

Diane Menzies reported on the recent activities of the Education Foundation.

Professor Robert Thayer's visit to NZ had co-incided with the CELA conference at Lincoln University. He was due to be in Auckland from 14-17 June, Wellington from 20-23 June, and Christchurch from 24 June to 9 July. Diane asked that Branches assist with finalising the programme for their area. Accommodation assistance was welcomed around the country for Professor Thayer and his wife.

Diane reminded members about the role of the Education Foundation and asked them to consider making a commitment in their will for the Foundation.

13 IFLA REPORT

The IFLA Report from Dr Diane Menzies, as printed in the Annual Report, as received.

Eastern Region Design Competition – Diane reported that three entries had been received for this competition. NZILA's entry had fully met the criteria. There had been delays in judging the entries but results should be available soon.

IFLA Eastern Region Conference, 2005 - Diane asked members, through NZILA's President, to show NZILA's support for the proposed eastern region conference to be held in Queensland, Australia.

Yvonne Weeber reported that there were plans for an Urbanism Downunder conference to be held some time in 2005.

2005 IFLA World Congress will be held on 27-28 June 2005 in Edinburgh. Theme – Landscape architecture leading the way.

IFLA has focused attention on expanding membership to India and China, two areas of high population and significant cultural landscapes.

The call for nominations at a regional level for Vice-President of the Eastern Region and Regional Treasurer, as well as for President and Treasurer at the International level, had been made.

IFLA was proposing to introduce a new award, Sir Geoffrey Jellicoe Gold Medal for Landscape Architecture Gold, for a practising landscape architect of international merit who has made a remarkable positive contribution to the environment.

14 HIGH COUNTRY LANDSCAPE GROUP PRESENTATION

As mentioned in the President's report, the High Country Landscape Group was established out of concerns at the change of Crown ownership to private freehold of major iconic landscapes, through the Tenure Review of Pastoral Leases process. Anne Steven made a presentation to members that covered background information, the current situation, and outlined the reasons why these landscapes were not being protected as landscape values of the South Island high country. Anne concluded by welcoming any members who wanted to join the group to contact her.

Di Lucas reported that Ines Stager had been appointed to the Aoraki Conservation Board. Yvonne Weeber commented that we should always be trying to get elected onto Conservation Boards.

Diane Menzies thanked Anne for her excellent presentation and for outlining the issues of concern to members.

15 GENERAL BUSINESS

Draft Long-Term Strategy (Appendix 1 in the Annual Report)

Di Lucas asked members to consider the proposal, as prepared by Mike Barthelmeh, for developing a Draft Long-Term Strategy. The aim of the Strategy would be to provide NZILA with a clear direction for the next five years. A possible structure could include a general mission statement, key broad goals, a series of objectives, and some outcomes, or tasks to be achieved. Suggestions from individual members and Branches on priorities were welcomed and should be directed to Mike Barthelmeh.
